### About the National Partners

#### Who we are

The National Partners in Canada's HIV Response is a coalition of 10 Canadian HIV/AIDS stakeholder groups representing national service organizations, frontline agencies, knowledge-providers, researchers and people who are living with and vulnerable to HIV and AIDS. Working respectfully with those most affected, we strive to ensure that government decisions and private sector actions are informed by an evidence-based knowledge of the needs of the community.

#### What we do

We collectively represent the concerns of many different organizations and sectors responding to HIV and related co-infections such as hepatitis C, and individuals living with HIV and we ensure that those concerns are heard at the national and international levels. We provide direct services that include developing programs and resources for people living with or vulnerable to HIV, we support the work of frontline agencies, we bring our specialized expertise to different dimensions of the epidemic, and we engage with many other stakeholders in strengthening Canada's response to HIV. We are also key partners with the Public Health Agency of Canada, the Canadian Institutes of Health Research, and other federal government departments and agencies in implementing the Federal Initiative to Address HIV/AIDS in Canada.

#### How we do it: The foundations of our response

##### *Greater Involvement of People Living with HIV and AIDS (GIPA)*

We embrace the GIPA principle, endorsed by the United Nations, to support a greater involvement of people living with HIV at all levels and to stimulate the creation of supportive political, legal and social environments.

##### *Meaningful engagement of vulnerable populations*

We learn from, and form alliances with, organizations that represent and/or work with vulnerable populations.

##### *Partnership*

We nurture mutually beneficial partnerships with each other as well as with other organizations in order to better inform and propel the HIV response across Canada.

##### *Global engagement*

We recognize that we cannot effectively address HIV/AIDS in Canada without combatting the epidemic globally.

##### *Collaborative learning*

We engage in collaborative learning to develop organizational capacity within the HIV/AIDS voluntary sector – at the national, provincial and local levels – to provide the necessary programs and services to support people living with, and at risk for, HIV and AIDS.

##### *Leadership*

We exercise leadership in facilitating discussions and actions that support the development of public policy in the national HIV response.
